He's been with the care farm since he was a few months old and about the size of a housecat. A team of staff, volunteers, and donors make sure he gets to live his best life. I deeply appreciate how many moving parts and big hearts it takes to make sure he has this chance, and the chance for so many people to learn from Gumball and find healing by spending time with him. My core belief is that good things happen when we can connect, and I'm so thankful to be a part of a nonprofit that's focused on connecting people, animals, and the earth.

I've seen firsthand the impact our donors have made, not just in the Rogue Valley, but throughout the country—especially during the pandemic and when the news reports repeatedly on atrocities. *Where's the*

solace? Where's the ability to breath? Where's the ability to focus on the positive? It's at Sanctuary One.

An investment in Sanctuary One creates a feeling of community and a sense of calm that we all could use more of now. Donors have provided feed and care to rescued animals who had nowhere else to go. Sanctuary One provides a loving home for rescued animals until their perfect adopter is found. In our 15 years we have taken in 1,114 animals. We have adopted 901. In 2023 we partnered with 15 animal agencies and law enforcement teams to take in animals.
