




Animal Sponsorship 2019


Sanctuary One is a care farm dedicated to rescuing domestic and farm animals, facilitating health and wellness for people, and promoting environmental stewardship.



We believe that a farm can do more than grow food for people's bellies; it can heal our bodies and lift our spirits, too, if we work together with animals and the earth for mutual healing.

In 2019 we are launching our first animal sponsorship. We are looking for business partners. Each animal has a \$2,000 sponsorship goal which will aid in food, shelter, veterinarian care, and species specific enrichment programs.

Throughout the year each sponsor will receive animal photos and updates to share with their community.

Sponsors will have onsite signs along our pond pasture path that all guests and volunteers at Sanctuary One will view.

Sponsor Levels

\$500 level –

Sponsorship Opportunity: Django



Django lived the first four years of his life on a heavy chain, treated like a lawnmower and nothing more. After two years in the care of Sanctuary One his coat and weight is healthy, but still bears the scars of the chain around his neck.

At Sanctuary One, he has learned what it means to be a happy and free goat. Django may have lived four years chained, but now plays with other goats, enjoys the freedom of grazing in a pasture, and experiences the love and attention he deserves.



Sponsorship Opportunity: Jigsaw

In 2012, Jigsaw was brought to Sanctuary One from the Boise Idaho Humane Society. Jigsaw was tiny, malnourished, and had pneumonia when he was found on the side of the road near a hog farm.

We don't know whether he escaped or if he was tossed out, but he now spends his days at Sanctuary One greeting visitors, napping, and enjoying a full life.

Freddy and Friday are brothers who were brought to Sanctuary One after being seized from Multnomah animal Control in northern Oregon. Today, they are able to live out their lives as bonded brothers and continue to show off their quirky and delightful disposition at the farm. 
Sponsorship Opportunity: Alpacas

In just one year we adopted over 20 alpacas. We always adopt in groups of at least 3, as alpacas are highly social.


These wonderful alpaca friends come to us from severe neglect and abuse cases through a partnership with an alpaca rescue in Washington state.

After living a harsh life at another farm, a mother sow was seized by animal control after the owner was charged with 30 counts of 2nd degree animal cruelty. On April 23, 2016 she gave birth to a tiny piglet named Pickles. Pickles was luckily born at the Whatcom Humane Society. From there he was brought to Sanctuary One as a piglet where he has developed into a fun outgoing pig. He loves to swim in his pig wallow and is a bit addicted to watermelons.


Sponsorship Opportunity: Howard
