Since its founding ten years ago, Sanctuary One has provided a refuge for over 700 animals in need.

Mistreated, frightened, sometimes sick, they have found a healing home with us, thanks to the generosity of our donors and the teamwork of staff, volunteers, and interns. Along the way, the farm has also provided a peaceful haven for people of all ages.

Our work wouldn't be possible without your help.

Your much-needed donation will be used to provide for the 50+ animals who currently call Sanctuary One home and keep us primed for the next group of animals in need. It also means we can continue our educational outreach and service learning programs. Together, we are making the world a kinder place!

Now more than ever, Sanctuary One's role as a safe harbor for farm animals is vital. With the recent closing of the northern California branch of Farm

Sanctuary, our partner and sister organization, we are the only 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization in southern Oregon and northern California to take in farm and domestic companion animals.

The animal control team in Del Norte County, a small isolated community on the California and Oregon coastline, know all too well how vital Sanctuary One is for ensuring safe adoptions. They responded to a neglect and abuse incident of a young Black Angus cow found in mud with no access to clean water or food. The agency quickly jumped in and rescued him. He was a big, friendly fellow, but the county was not equipped to keep him. Everyone interested in adopting him wanted to use him for slaughter; even the vet who did his welfare check said he should be butchered. The staff at the shelter refused, but they didn't have the means to keep him safe. They reached out to us and soon Moose, as we named him, joined Sanctuary One. Now Moose, whom someone described as a dog in a cow suit, lives with another Sanctuary One rescues, Bowie and Lennon, calves saved from the dairy industry meat market. Altogether they live in their new home, safe from neglect or mistreatment.

Over the last decade we've acted as a pressure release valve for rescue groups who are on the front lines, like the Del Norte animal control team. **In 2017, we rescued 28 alpacas in partnership with a Washington state rescue organization.** In just one neglect and abuse case alone, the rescue took in 30 alpacas — the majority of whom were pregnant. The agency's director told us that without our help in taking the other alpacas, she would not be able to continue her work because they would be at capacity and unable to take in more animals in need. With taking the 28 alpacas, it allowed her the space and means to continue intaking abuse and neglect cases.

Sanctuary One has a luxury not all animal rescues have: If an animal isn't adopted, we are their forever home. Even if it takes nearly six years to find an animal a forever home (as it did for our beloved dog Gabe), we happily provide love and care to help the animal live a healthy, happy life at the farm.

Animals, however, are not the only ones who find happiness at the farm. **Volunteers often tell me Sanctuary One is an island of peace in a world of chaos.** I hope you find it rewarding to know that through your generosity, you are bringing more peace into the lives of animals and people. One volunteer sums up our shared work: "The most special thing about Sanctuary One is the interconnectedness of the animals, the people, and the land that we are using to house these rescued animals. For me, being at Sanctuary One and volunteering here has been therapeutic. I did not expect that. It has taught me more about my place amongst other animals on this earth. It has brought to my attention how connected we are. Sanctuary One is not only about caring for these animals, it also has been, truly, a sanctuary for me too." Volunteers of course, aren't the only ones impacted by the opportunity you provide.

We are now in our third year partnering with Maslow Project, a local nonprofit serving youth experiencing homelessness. During the summer, a group of youth and staff work on the farm each week, both with the animals and in the garden (where nearly **500 pounds of produce was donated to local food**

banks this year). One recent high school graduate told us on her very first visit to the farm that "working with Sanctuary One has showed me that there are people who care more about the animals than themselves; with my past experiences in life it is hard to believe that there are people that have so much love to give." Most 18-year-old high school graduates are idealistic hopefuls, going into the world bright eyed and dreaming of how they're going to change the world. Life has not afforded this young graduate the same attitude.

And yet, because of you, she now has a new outlook and hope.

P.S. Recently Del North County Sheriff's department was alerted because a neighbor noticed two dead calves in someone's yard. Over the course of a few days the agency moved both a child and adult into protective care and removed 160 live animals out of the household.
